*1969 News from the Whitehorse Star***LIQUOR VOTE SET FOR JUNE 23**

All Yukon residents, 19 years and up, will be asked to answer this question on Monday, June 23:

"Are you in favour of lowering the legal age for the consumption of alcoholic beverages from 21 years to 19 years of age?"

Commissioner James Smith announced the date and terms of the plebiscite this morning. It is believed to be the first time in Canada that underage voters will have had an opportunity to express their opinions on a question which directly affected them.

There will be no enumeration of voters, and no voters list compiled for the plebiscite, which will be conducted by Federal Returning Officer Harold J. MacDonald of Whitehorse. Instead, each voter will swear an affidavit that they are of the full age of 19 and they were ordinarily resident in the Yukon Territory on March 20, 1969. This was the date on which Yukon Territorial Council approved the idea of the plebiscite being held.

Court Told:

'Blood Gushed Like Water'
Murder Suspect Committed For Trial

Zoltan Macko was committed for trial Friday, at the conclusion of a preliminary hearing into a charge of non capital murder. The 30 year old miner from Hungary has been charged in connection with the shooting death of Mehmed Dupobac, also 30, at Arctic Gold and Silver Mine near Carcross on December 10 last year.

During the two day hearing the court heard a large number of crown witnesses, miners, tell that an all night drinking party had been going on in room eight of the bunkhouse, occupied by Jordan Kalajdjiev and Frank Kuster. The two roommates were present, as were Dupobac and others. Later the group was joined by the accused Macko, known to his acquaintances as "Zorro".

Witness testified that some time before six a.m. there was an argument and a scuffle between Kalajdjiev, known as "Blackie" and Macko, who eventually left and returned to his own room down the hall.

Shortly afterwards he was seen outside Kalajdjiev's room and two shots were heard.

The court learned that in the corridor Zorro allegedly was calling Blackie to come outside, and accused him of kicking him (Zorro) in the face during the fight.

Kalajdjiev, a dark-haired 26 year old Yugoslav, testified that he tried to keep

the door shut but that Mehmed Dupobac known as "Mayo" went out in the hall to act as peacemaker.

Witnesses said that a discussion followed, a third shot was fired, and Dupobac fell to the floor with a shotgun blast in his chest.

Walter Parsons of room six next door told how he overheard both the fight in the room and the shooting. He said that during the party he heard Zorro's voice say "help, help, don't do that." And someone else in room eight say "Don't Jordan, that's enough." There was mostly talk, and then later three shots.

LIKE A GUSH OF WATER

"After the third shot I heard a sound like a gush of water," said Parsons, "and blood came under the door of my room and up the sides of the closet."

Other testimony revealed how the First Aid man, William Evans was summoned but could do nothing for the deceased. Evans said he took a gun away from Zorro.

The preliminary hearing was conducted before Magistrate John Varcoe, with D.S. Collins appearing for the crown and H.H. Regehr for the defence. It was not immediately known when the case would go to trial.

1902 News from the Whitehorse Star

- Has Gone to the Outside -

Ed La Belle, Peter Fournier's Partner, Left Dawson July 22nd

His Name Appeared in the Printed Passenger Lists -- Fournier Arraigned and Remanded for Seven Days -- Did Not Plead.

Dawson, Aug. 30 - It has been ascertained that Ed La Belle, the partner of Peter Fournier, who is now under arrest here suspected of being implicated in the murder of three men near Ogilvie the middle of last June, left for the outside on July 22nd as a first-class passenger on the steamer Columbian and though there hangs over his head a suspicion of having abetted in the commission of two or three murders, he traveled under his real name and made no secrecy of his having departed. His name, with the other passengers, was printed in the local papers at the time, and the list is now on file at the police station and at the White Pass office.

Fournier was arraigned on the 23rd inst. in the police court on the charge of murder in the first degree, in having killed Leon Boutillette. He did not plead, but was remanded for seven days, when he will enter a plea.

It is now stated that the report published that \$400 was found on the person of Fournier, is erroneous, and that he had no money when arrested.

The police have received the photographs of three of the five men who left Whitehorse together on the trip down river. They are Leon Boutillette, Alphonso Constantin and Beaudoin.

The body of the former was found near Indian River, and from a tag on a key chain was the name which led to the identification of the remains. The body contained three gunshot wounds which told that he was

shot from behind, and as he turned to see his assailants was shot twice through the head.

The body of Beaudoin was found with a rope on one arm and one on an ankle with slip knots and loops on the ends, which convince the police that the man was murdered and then weighted with stones which dropped off by the continual jolting over the gravel bottom of the river. His head was crushed and there could be no doubt that he also was murdered.

Alphonso Contantin, not showing up in Dawson, can be set down as being the third victim. He came to this country in '98 and became interested on Last Chance.

Beaudoin was a native of Beauce county, Quebec, and had just graduated from college when he concluded to come to the Klondike probably on the representations of Constantin. He was 23 years of age and a bright young man, with the physique of one who is not satisfied with the humdrum life of the east.

The three left Montreal June 4 and reached Whitehorse June 12. June 16 they started in a small boat in company with two other men, who joined the party at Whitehorse.

The body of Boutillette was found on July 16, and that of Beaudoin on August 1. The remains of a man found near Selkirk so badly decomposed that the body was hardly to be recognized, may be the third man of the latest river mystery.

The Weekly Star, Saturday, August 30, 1902
