A CONSIGNMENT
OF HOCKEY JUNK

It's not often a local hockey
team has a chance to vie for the
Stanley Cup, but it happened one
time in Yukon history and the re-
sults of the contest make it prob-
able that it will never happen again.

Hockey was big in the Klondike
in 1904, and the competition so
fierce that local promoters of the
sport were looking for bigger and
greater challenges. With the typical
Yukon "if you're going to go for it,
you might as well go for the top"
attitude, Dawson organizers wrote
to Ottawa challenging the World
Champions to a Stanley Cup duel.
The challenge was accepted.

The Klondike team sallied
forth from Dawson to do battle
with the Ottawa Invincibles, also
known as "The Silver Seven."

Ottawa Hockey Team Won
First Game of Series by Score
of 9-2. The Dawson Hockey
team went down in overwhelm-
ing defeat before the Ottawa
Invincibles by a score of 23-2
in the second.

CPA DEATH TOLL 52

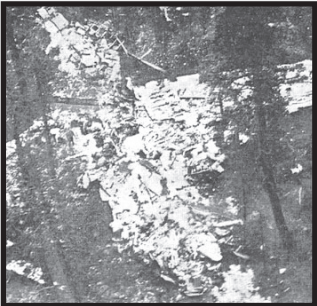
Canadian Pacific Airline's Flight
21 exploded and crashed last Thurs-
day afternoon on its way north from
Vancouver, killing all 52 people
aboard. Five Whitehorse residents
were among the dead. Seven other
northern families suffered losses. It
was the first fatal crash on the north-
ern run.

The DC-6B was fifty miles north
of Ashcroft B.C. and thirty miles west
of 100 Mile House when eye wit-
nesses said there appeared to be an
explosion, the tail section dropped
off and the plane plummeted into the ground. A pall of smoke was spotted by
B.C. Forestry lookouts and a small aircraft dispatched to the scene minutes later.
The crash occurred just before five o'clock.

At 4:40, about 15 minutes before the crash, the captain radioed that he was
changing course slightly to avoid turbulence. Moments later, the stricken aircraft
made three desperate "Mayday" calls to the Prince George airport. Then silence.

The plane left Vancouver at 3:30 p.m. and was scheduled to land at Prince
George at 5:20. It had not yet picked up other connecting passengers at Fort
St. John.

News of the disaster spread quickly in Whitehorse and anxious families here
kept long distance telephone lines jammed for several hours. CPA officials and
RCMP officers contacted next of kin as soon as the passenger list had been
verified from Vancouver.



NEW FLAG FLIES



Canada's new flag is flying over Whitehorse to-night, following a simple 10-minute ceremony outside the RCMP barracks at noon which was watched by a few hundred spectators.


Snow was falling as the Union Jack came down and the scarlet-and-white ensign was hoisted in its place. RCMP Staff-Sgt. W.A. Coombs headed the flag party. Commissioner Gordon Cameron and numerous local dignitaries were among the listeners as the Rev. Harold Marston, president of the Whitehorse Ministerial Association, and Bishop Coudert both spoke briefly in a dedication ceremony.

About 150 local school-children took time off to attend the event. It was all over in 10 minutes, and the crowd dispersed quietly, leaving the new flag fluttering in a drizzle of snowflakes.

Only two people stood and watched as another flag was raised simultaneously outside the federal building. Earlier this morning, it also flew over the Whitehorse General Hospital.

What's going to happen to all those old Union Jacks? No official word on their fate was available this afternoon.

TORNADO HITS WATSON LAKE


What has been described as being a phenomena in this part of Canada occurred on Wednesday, September 9 between two and 3:00 p.m. when a tornado formed over Watson lake, raced down the far shore opposite the airport and up the bank to dissipate somewhere in the bush by the tank farm.

The tornado was accompanied by a short but extremely heavy hail storm with some of the stones measuring three-quarters of an inch in diameter.

Pete Koszuk, the only known eye-witness to the forming of the tornado said the water began to swirl and gradually lift off the surface.

Evidence of its violence can be seen on the path it took when it struck the lake shore. Poplar, jack pine and spruce trees varying in height 30 to 70 feet and four to 10 inches in diameter were uprooted and piled together like matches. Fortunately the tornado struck only the lake and the trees.

FIRST AIRCRAFT

Whitehorse Paved the Way for Aviation in the North.

For a history of aviation in the Yukon Territory we have to go back to June, 1920, when Capt. H.T. Douglas of the U.S. Air Force and Capt. H.A. Leroyer of the Canadian Air Board arrived in Whitehorse to talk over a proposed international aeroplane flight from Mineola, N.Y. to Nome Alaska. They both came with the authority of their respective governments to make all necessary arrangements for landing places, fuel, supplies, etc. In commenting on the proposed flight the Whitehorse STAR of that day described it as "an event that will go down in history as one of the most daring conceptions of the potentialities of aerial flight that has ever been conceived since the possibilities of a lighter-than-air craft as a means of transportation became, through the inventive genius of man, a certainty."
