Copper distillery brews more than booze

The trio from the Kluane First Nation were walking back to their truck when they came across a metal object that was partially buried by a fallen tree, roughly 70 metres from the shore of Kluane Lake near Burwash Landing.

Burwash is located some 200 kilometres northwest of Whitehorse.

"I just happened to stumble over it," said Johnson.

At first, Johnson thought they had found an old abandoned breather from a bulldozer. But closer inspection revealed that the contraption of copper cans was actually a still for making liquor.

Finding the old still was interesting, but the real find lay inside one of the copper cans.

The hunters found a leather pouch full of papers, which the trio at first thought might be identification papers of the owner of the long-forgotten still.

However, the pouch contained a wad of 47 bills of paper money.

"At first, we thought it was American money," Johnson recounted Tuesday, as he described the bills that were much longer and wider than today's currency.

The money was actually Canadian, printed much earlier this century.

The party, which included Ed and Dwayne Johnson, distant relatives of Keith, found 10-, 20- and 50- dollar bills, dating mostly from the mid-1930s. The oldest is a \$20 bill printed 2, 1917 by the Canadian Bank of Commerce January. In all, the stack of money totalled \$780. While the money was well used, all the original dyes and lettering was still intact.

Following the discovery, Dwayne grew a little philosophical back at the party's hunt camp. "Yep, we'll never look at these mountains the same," he told his friends.

Keith brought the money to Whitehorse Tuesday to deposit it in a safety deposit box at CIBC. The bank staff, he said, marvelled at the condition of the money.

During an interview following his historic bank transaction, Johnson guessed that the money and the still were likely left behind by a gold prospector in the 1930s. Following the Gold Rush era in the Klondike, some gold hunters moved down to the Kluane area and mined during the Depression.

But the still was the only sign of human activity the hunting party could find in the area.

Now people are trying to figure out how much the money might be worth.

"When I asked if they (the bank) could count for inflation, they said it would take a while," said Keith.

The money as a currency might still only be worth its face value, but as a collectible it could be worth much more.

Keith has already done some research and uncovered that coin brokers value 1935 \$10 bills at around \$125 each. Twenty dollar bills can be worth \$160.

Johnson, a 44-year-old heavy equipment operator, hasn't decided what to do with the money, but he figures the museum in Burwash might be interested in the still, which the hunting party also kept.

BURIED IN TRENCH

Two men were buried in a trench yesterday afternoon at the vocational school site when an earth and gravel wall collapsed on them. Most seriously injured was Ronald Burnett of Whitehorse who received a broken leg and a broken pelvis. Vernon Ekland received also a broken pelvis.

When the wall came down, the two men were working close together in the trench being dug to accommodate sewer and water pipes. They were completely covered by the slide but, fortunately, Bennett and White Superintendent Nelson Ford knew their exact location and, when the rescue effort began, he could pinpoint their location and dug them out.

The trench at the point of collapse was approximately 14 feet deep. About the first five feet were frozen ground but beneath that the gravel was loose. Both city fire departments rushed to the scene and also workmen from other parts of the city were called to assist.

It was Ekland's second trip to the hospital in three weeks. He was just released after a broken ankle healed.

BOBBY KENNEDY CLIMBS MT. KENNEDY

Mountain and mountain climbing stories in The STAR have always received prominent coverage. One of the interesting climbs was made by the late U.S. Senator Robert Kennedy in March 1965 when he climbed the Canadian mountain named for his brother President John F. Kennedy. The mountain, 145 miles north-west of Whitehorse, forms a triangle with Mount Alverstone and Mount Hubbard and until that time was the highest (13,905 ft.) unclimbed peak in the St. Elias mountains. When the mountain was named for the late President, the National Geographic Society and the Boston Museum of Science decided to conduct a joint survey which would result in a completely detailed map. Bobby Kennedy, though he had never climbed before, joined the party at the last minute and thus the world press became very interested. Newsmen descended on the Yukon in droves but the Whitehorse Star had the first published pictures of the event. Veteran Everest climber Jim Whitaker of Seattle led the three man party of Kennedy and Barry Prather up the last ridge where they unroped and let the Senator ascend the last 50 yards alone to be the first man on top. It was not a particularly tough climb, as climbs go, but it was a personal pilgrimage for Kennedy, who planted the Kennedy family crest, Canadian flags and National Geographic emblem on the top. Kennedy Mountain, at the lower camps, was crawling with other members of the climb, military men and helicopters, private planes rented by the media, the ice field research people and anyone else who could scrounge a ride. A National Film Board crew guided by Whitehorse mountaineer Monty Alford, recorded the climb and Yukoners Bob Erlam, Alex Van Bibber and Wayne MacDonald took pictures which appeared in Life, Time and The Whitehorse Star. The latter three, incidentally, were also present when Kennedy came down that night from the ascent. They fed him steak, instant mashed potatoes, ice cream and the heel of a bottle of Madeira wine which someone (probably Bob) had stashed in a pack sack. Back in Whitehorse, Kennedy dropped in to the Capital Hotel to get cleaned up and have a drink with the locals. He bought a round and paid for it with a cheque which owner Cal Miller kept and had framed. Said Cal, “I told him I wanted to keep it as a souvenir of the next President of the United States.”

1901 News from the Whitehorse Star

Five New Boats
To Be Built By The W.P. & Y. Route

150 To 200 Ship Carpenters Will Be Employed In The Work

Mr. G.C. Mellott is authority for the statement that the management of the W.P.& Y. Route have purchased five steamers from the Canadian Pacific, used formerly on the Stickene river by the C.P.R., and that they will be brought to Skagway and taken down for shipment to White Horse where they will be rebuilt with a view to the needs of river navigation. Hotline & Co., of Seattle, have the contract for the construction of the new boats and will have from 150 to 200 ship carpenters here inside of a month to commence active operations. The boats purchased by the W.P.&Y. Route are the Ogilvie, Hamlin and McConnell, which are now at Wrangel, the Dawson, now on the ways at Vancouver, which, though completed has never been launched and the Walsh, which has been lying in the Fraser river since the failure of the route up the stickene river to the Yukon. The purchase of these boats give the W.P.& Y. Route absolute control of fifteen first class river steamers, and will practically place the whole of next season’s transportation business to the interior in its hands.
Captain Sanborn will superintend the construction and see that they are put up in accordance with contract. The contract calls for their completion by 1st of June next.
A new freight tariff sheet will also be issued in a short time, which will do away with the present system of charges by weight and measurement, and in lieu thereof all freight will be classified and rated according to the grade and quality of the goods.
Among contemplated improvements for the rapid handling of freight a large derrick will be erected on the wharf at White Horse for loading and unloading machinery and other heavy material.
If it becomes necessary another addition to the immense warehouse will also be built, and as soon as the ground thaws sufficiently to allow work to be commenced an electric light plant will be installed for the purpose of lighting the depot, wharf and warehouses.
