THE WHITE DEATH

f all the natural phenomena peculiar to the
Rocky mountain region none is more strange,
or terrible than the mysterious storm known
to the Indians as "the white death". Scientific men have
never yet had an opportunity of investigating it, because
it comes at the most unexpected times and may keep away
from a certain locality for years. Well-read men who have
been through it say that it is really a frozen fog. But where
the fog comes from is more than anyone can say. This
phenomenon occurs most frequently in the northern part
of Colorado, in Wyoming, and occasionally in Montana.

About two years ago a party of three women and two
men were crossing North Park in a wagon in the month
of February. The air was bitterly cold, but dry as a bone
and motionless. The sun shone with almost startling bril-
liancy. As the five people drove along over the crisp snow
they did not experience the least cold, but really felt most
comfortable, and rather enjoyed the trip. Mountain peaks
fifty miles away could be seen as distinctly as the pine
trees beside the roadside.

Suddenly one of the women put her hand up to her face
and remarked that something had stung her. Then other
members of the party did the same thing, although not a
sign of an insect could be seen. All marveled greatly at
this. A moment later they noticed that the distant moun-
tains were disappearing behind a cloud of mist. Mist in
Colorado in February? Surely there must be some mistake.
But there was no mistake, because within ten minutes a
gentle wind began to blow and the air became filled with
fine particles of something that scintillated like diamond
dust in the sunshine. Still the people drove on until they
came to a cabin where a man signaled them to stop. With
his head tied up in a bundle of mufflers, he rushed out and
handed the driver a piece of paper on which was written:
"Come into the house quick, or this storm will kill all of
you. Don't talk outside here."

Of course no time was lost in getting under cover and
putting the horses in the stable. But they were a little too
late, for in less than an hour the whole party was sick with
violent coughs and fever. Before the next morning one of
the women died with all the symptoms of pneumonia. The
others were violently ill of it, but managed to pull through
after long sickness. - Aisle's Magazine

City Resident Makes Polar History

Whitehorse resident Martyn Williams has
become the first Canadian to reach both poles
of the earth using only skis and a small dog
team.

Williams, 44 and his three companions on
the International north Pole Expedition were
picked up Saturday after six grueling weeks
of fighting severe temperatures, driving
winds, and tough, unpredictable sea ice.

All four members of the group are South
Pole veterans. Australian Mike McDowell 44,
accompanied Williams to the South Pole in
1990. Norwegian brothers Sjur, 27, and
Simen Modre, 29, traveled to the South Pole
in 1991.

Many people have reached both poles with-
out mechanized assistance. Until now, only
Briton Robert Swan traveled from South to
North.

The group is now resting at the advance
base on Ellesmere Island before they return
tonight to Resolute Bay, N.W.T.

Tough terrain slowed progress for the first
few weeks. However, the expedition traveled
more than 25 kilometers a day in the last cou-
ple of weeks to make up for last time.

They had to reach the pole by May 12. After
that date, warming temperatures cause fog
and broken ice, which makes air pick-up im-
possible.

1902 News from the Whitehorse Star

A Record Breaker

Last fall Supt. Gen. E. Pulham made the assertion that before the winter was over he would break all previous records of fast travel between White Horse and Dawson and last night he arrived from the latter point in a W.P. & Y. Route stage that made the heretofore unprecedented time of 3 days and 10 hours.

Although the early part of the season on the winter trail offered many obstacles for rapid traveling Mr. Pulham did not lose his nerve but went ahead with his work and under his management the W.P. & Y. Route has furnished a regular, rapid and easy, even luxurious, means of reaching the Klondike capital from the northern terminus of the railroad.

For doing this work Mr. Pulham has had every facility that money could procure, and in addition has had the assistance of an exceptionally competent staff of assistants. This end of the line has been well and closely looked after by Assistant Supt. H. Wheeler, while the stage drivers employed have acquired skill through years of experience in the north.

The fastest round trip on record between White Horse and Dawson was that made by Driver Jack

McMillan who returned here a few days ago after an absence of only 8 days and 2 hours.

The management of the W.P. & Y. Route have made special efforts this season to meet the requirements of the interior transportation business. Although their contract only calls for a five day service hardly a day has passed since the road got in good shape but that one or more stages have not left White Horse and a like number arrived. From four and a half to five days are usually consumed on a single trip unless the weather happens to be bad, when it requires a little more time.

The result of this policy of the W.P. & Y. Route has been that they have secured most of the passenger traffic and even those who have gone on other stage lines at reduced rates of fare have kicked themselves, so to speak, before the end of their journey was reached, for the reason that it had taken from a week to ten days longer to make the trip in much less comfortable conveyances, and their extra expenses for the additional time spent on the road have more than equalled the difference of fare between the independent lines and that of the W.P. & Y. Route.
